# **No Wonder There are No More Steam Engines!!**



On September 10, 1951 approximately 60 housewives carrying dirty mops and signs proclaiming "Down With The Soot" marched on the Illinois Central roundhouse in Bossier City. They were protesting against the large amounts of dirt and soot which they say came from the railroad yards. The women marched into the yard about 5:30 pm and knocked on the office door. The superintendent said the company would do everything in its power to see that the soot was kept at a minimum. (What else could he say?) One woman stopped traffic on East Texas St. with a large "Stop" sign and a whistle! Some of the women carried signs saying "Our Homes are Ruined", "Why Not Move?", "Bossier – the Soot City".

At the time of the protest, a lawsuit was awaiting action by the United States Supreme Court. A judgment of \$43,863.34 with 5 percent interest had been handed down to the plaintiffs in 1948. It was appealed to the circuit court of appeals and sustained. The railroad then made an application to the Supreme Court for a review of the case. One of the women said the smoke was cut down during the trial but soon resumed as bad as ever.


The superintendent said his company had tried its best to keep the smoke to a minimum, and that the company had already gone 75 percent diesel.

Obviously, the women were not satisfied. One said that sometimes it looks like someone was standing outside her window throwing dirt in by the shovel full, and that she would wake up in the morning to find her bed full of soot and her face black!

Well, eventually they got their way because steam engines were gone in a few years. Too bad.......
