## **O.** Winston Link's Sounds of Steam



At our April meeting we listened to O. Winston Link's recording of the *General's* sounds during it's 1962 Centennial Celebration run, plus a sampling of sounds from one of the other albums pictured above. All railroaders are familiar with Link's great night photos of Norfolk & Western steam engines in the 1950's, but not everyone is aware that he became known for his audio recordings before he became recognized for his photography!

Link released five LP recordings of the N&W between 1957 and 1977, plus the 1962 *General* 45 rpm. All six are in collections at the LSUS Archives, where the above photo was taken. The "Long Play" 33 1/3 rpm LP technology had been introduced in 1948 and with the LP's high quality came a demand for better recording techniques and more interesting sounds. According to an article in the Summer 2001 <u>Classic Trains</u> magazine, Link stated: "Everything we had was the best. My Ampex equipment, people told me at the time, would be good until the year 2000. I thought that was a long way off. I got the stereo recorder in 1958 and am still using it…I had to go to the bank and get the money for it. I spent about \$4000 on that trip; I was in hock for a long time, but I got great stuff with it."

In addition to capturing the sounds of the steam engines, Link recorded other sounds from the background such as howling dogs, cows mooing, crossing signals ringing, children talking and railroad men explaining what was going on. Those sounds, combined with the steam engine, train and track noises, capture a wonderful "image" of that era. Unfortunately, current and future generations will not experience such an environment firsthand.

The final track on *The Fading Giant* album was made on Christmas Eve 1957 at Rural Retreat, VA. You can hear Mrs. J.E. Dodson playing carols in a church nearby as train 42 from New Orleans, the *Pelican*, pulls into the station. According to Link: "We were riding around looking for locations...we heard the chimes...We asked her to start playing about 20 minutes before the train arrived and to continue playing until we told her to stop...She did fine."

One time Link paid a lady a dollar to use her electricity. After they were set up and waiting for the train, the lady disconnected an extension cord for some unexplained reason and they lost their opportunity. After that, he got his own power supply. It used two 12-volt automobile batteries; a DC motor powered a 120-volt AC generator to provide dependable power without noise that might affect the recording heads.

The LP and 45 rpm albums shown on the first page have been re-issued in a 5-CD boxed set and are available from the O. Winston Link Museum in Roanoke, VA by calling (540) 982-5465 or going to their website at <u>www.linkmuseum.org</u> A visit to the museum is really a trip you should try to make.

We will listen to more of Link's sounds of steam at our May meeting.
