

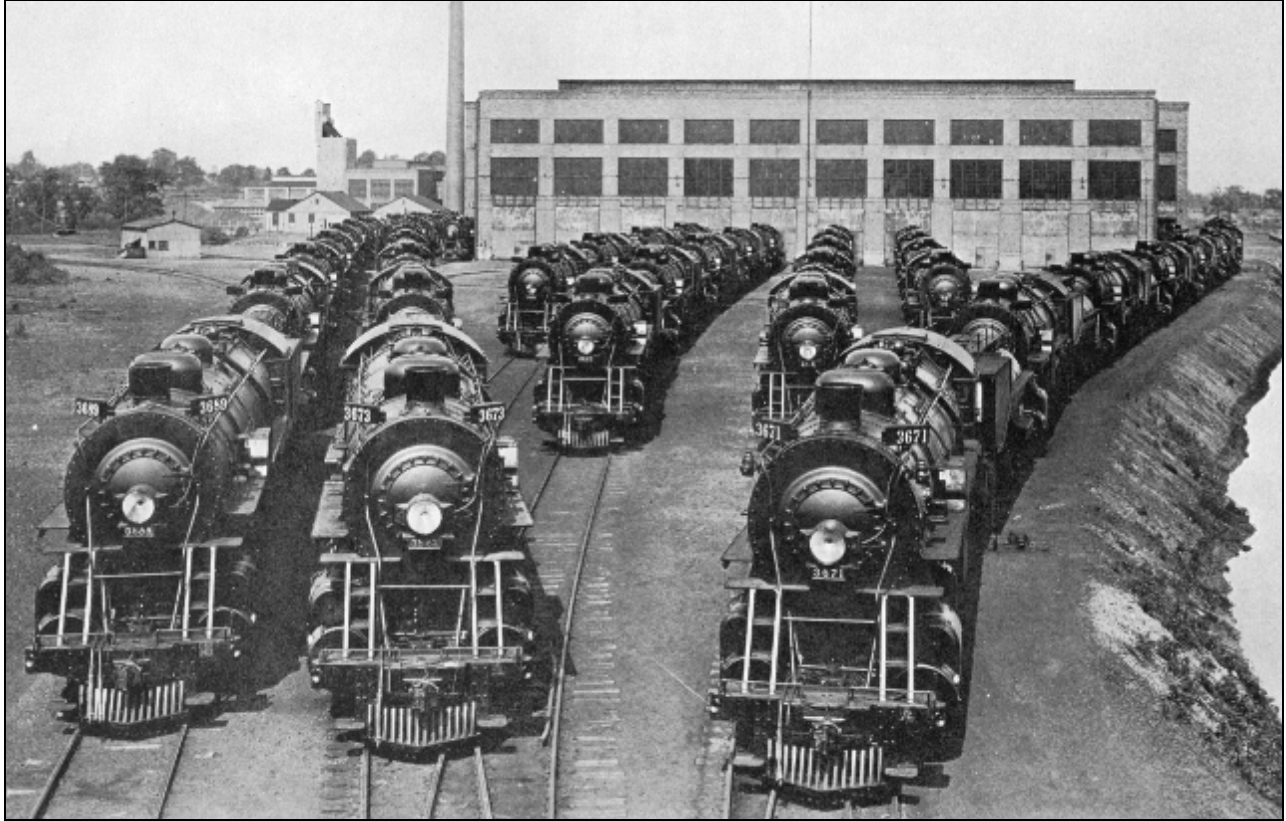

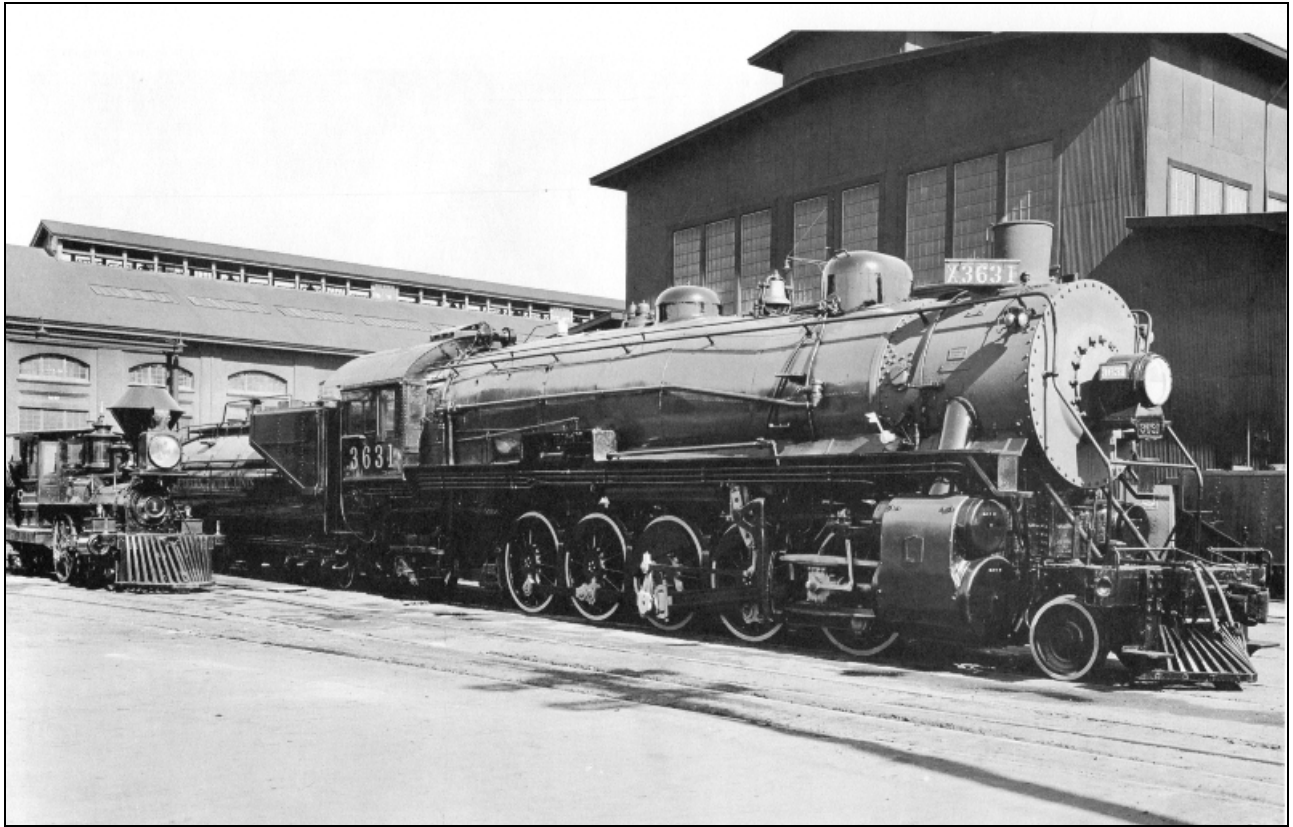
Our 30th Year

Fifty 2-10-2 Type Steam Locomotives Ready for Shipment



Between 1919 and 1923 the Southern Pacific received 150 locomotives of the 2-10-2 type from The Baldwin Locomotive Works. Shown above is a group of 50 locomotives ready for shipment from their Eddystone Plant in Pennsylvania. Mr. S. M. Vauclain, then President of The Baldwin Locomotive Works, realized that the stimulating effect of such a large purchase of new equipment by one railroad would bolster up the spirit of the country, so he arranged to ship 20 of these locomotives across the continent in one solid train. The train was called the *Prosperity Special* and had a length of nearly 2,000 feet without the propelling engines. Before the trip began, civic officials and public press in the towns along the route were notified and it was said the no other train ever received so much publicity in a short period of time.

The *Prosperity Special* left the Eddystone Plant on May 26, 1921 with a scheduled arrival in Los Angeles on June 30th. The train of 20 new locomotives was moved intact over the entire route. From El Paso to Yuma it was accompanied by the Division Superintendent in his private car. While ascending Beaumont Hill out of Yuma, the train was handled by seven locomotives: two Mikado type on the head end, one Mikado and one Consolidation behind the 10th dead engine, two Consolidations behind the 15th dead engine and one Mallet behind the rear dead engine. The trip covered 3743 miles. Throughout the entire run, the bearings kept cool and there were no mechanical troubles; a testimony to the excellence of the material and workmanship put into the locomotives.
