Where Can You Take A Train Ride ?

Many people that visit our Shreveport Railroad Museum have <u>never</u> ridden on a passenger train, or have not ridden on one since they were a child. Since there has been no passenger train service in Shreveport for over 40 years, and not much chance that Amtrak will ever have a station here, they assume that they will never have that opportunity. However, there are several options for a "Day Trip" on a passenger train within 100 miles of Shreveport. Take advantage of our fall weather and make a few railroad memories!

As you may know, the <u>Texas State Railroad</u> is not owned by the State of Texas anymore. The state's parks and wildlife department successfully ran the railroad until the management was privatized with a contract with American Heritage Railways in September of 2007. In August of 2012 American Heritage Railways sold the Texas State Railroad to Iowa Pacific Holdings, the current owner.

Roundtrip steam train excursions are scheduled on Saturday and Sunday through November 10 this year. One of their historic steam engines depart from both the Palestine and Rusk depots at 11:00 a.m. and return at 3:30 p.m. The trip is 1 ½ hours each way with 1 ½ hours lunch layover at the opposite depot for a total 4 ½ hour experience. Box lunches are available for pre-order, or you may bring your own lunch. Beverages and snacks are available for purchase in the concession car. Also, there is now an option to ride "half-way". You leave the depot at 11:00, ride for 45 minutes, then change trains and return to the depot from which you departed. The transfer takes place at the half way point where the two trains pass one another. This is a good option for young children because the total train ride is only 1 ½ hours. Your Editor did this with his 2 year old grandson recently and it was a great "first train ride".

Last Saturday Texas & Pacific steam engine 316 (nee 201), a 4-6-0 ten-wheeler, was the Palestinebased engine, and 2-8-0 Consolidation engine 300 was the one from Rusk. Both looked and sounded great! The coaches and other facilities are in very good shape, and the staff is very friendly and helpful as usual.

Also, there is now an organization called the Texas State Railroad Society (<u>www.tsrrsociety.org</u>) that has a great museum/gift shop at the Palestine depot. Please consider joining that organization whose mission is to educate and preserve the history and the environment of the Texas State Railroad by supporting its function.

They are having a "*Pumpkin Patch Express*" on Saturdays and Sundays from October 5 through October 27th departing from Rusk only. Their website says: "*Pick your own pumpkin, visit Trick or Treat Street, and enjoy a hayride, games, live entertainment and more! Kids don't forget to wear your costumes! Lunches are not included for this event; a food vendor will be available at the pumpkin patch.*" Call 1-877-726-7245 or go to <u>www.TexasStateRR.com</u> for all schedules, fares and reservations.



Surprisingly, you can go online and buy an <u>Amtrak</u> ticket from Shreveport to any of the more than 500 Amtrak stations across the United States! However, this example of a "day trip" will focus on Dallas Union Station as a destination. Other destinations can be hours or days away.

If you purchase a ticket from Shreveport to Dallas, the first leg will be a bus ride from the Shreveport Regional Airport to the Amtrak station in Longview, Texas. The bus leaves at 6:45 a.m. and arrives in Longview at 8:00 a.m. where you would board Amtrak Train 21 (the *Texas Eagle*) at 8:28 a.m. Scheduled arrival at Dallas Union Station is 11:30 a.m. You can spend about 3 hours "looking around" Dallas and then board Amtrak Train 22 back to Longview at 3:40 p.m., arriving at the Shreveport Regional Airport at 7:45 p.m. The cost for an adult ticket is \$23.00 each way, or \$46.00 total. Senior rates are slightly less.

Another option, which eliminates the bus ride and increases the length of the train ride is to drive to Marshall. This is the option that your Editor prefers. The photos above were taken from the Marshall Depot balcony. You can park free at the Amtrak Station/T&P Depot Museum and see Texas & Pacific Steam Engine No. 400 and a Union Pacific caboose which are on static display there. Amtrak Train 21 is scheduled to arrive Marshall at 7:50 a.m. daily on its way to Dallas, and at 7:01 p.m. on the return trip.

Amtrak's reputation for not being on time is well known. However, it has improved significantly and you can check actual performance history by calling Amtrak or going to their website. Take a book to read, your camera and enjoy a day of train riding and people watching!



The <u>Historic Jefferson Railway</u> in Jefferson, Texas is great fun for kids and adults alike. Plus, Jefferson has many other attractions including a boat ride, many antique stores, a model train store and several restaurants. Their steam locomotive is currently undergoing extensive repairs so they have commissioned an antique gas-powered locomotive, the *Critter*, into service. The *Critter* is a gas-powered Plymouth locomotive built in 1964. The train ride takes you through the beautiful woods and wetlands along the Big Cypress Bayou.
